

# HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE

This is an OCR Cambridge Technicals course equivalent to 2 A levels. Health and Social Care is a qualification that is ideally suited to those students who have an interest in the increasingly popular field of medical, social care or early years work.

The course content is assessment via course work only. It demands a high level of commitment to written work. A good standard of written English and numeracy is essential for this course in order to achieve the qualification.

The course aims to prepare students for progression to university or employment. It should be stressed that this course covers an extensive range of discipline, and is not just related to the caring of the elderly or children. There may also be an opportunity to complete a 'work placement' as part of the course. Students would need to devote some of their 'free lessons' to complete this, but this does give extremely valuable 'on the job' experience. University places in the Health and Social Care sector, and in particular, nursing/midwifery are highly competitive. Therefore, a work experience placement would be of great benefit to the application process. There may be an opportunity to interview prospective nursing degree students in the University of South Wales.

## Assessment Procedure

You will be continually assessed throughout the course through project work, assignments, peer assessments, case studies and workbooks. The assessment grades range from:-

- Distinction\* - equivalent to an A\* grade
- Distinction - equivalent to an A grade
- Merit - equivalent to a C grade
- Pass - equivalent to an E grade
- Fail

The grades awarded over the two years will be accumulated to make up a double award grade.

Course work will need to be completed during school and at home so a high level of commitment is required. All units are of equal weighting and grades from all units in both years 12 and 13 will count towards the final grade achieved at the end of year 13.

## Entry Requirements

It is essential that students have a minimum of 5 GCSE's grade C or above to gain entry onto the course, but this is subject to close consideration on an individual basis. However, there is **no requirement** to have completed GCSE Health and Social Care.
